
This category showcases the amazing selection of all films shot in the Jefferson region or were created by filmmakers and animators living in Northern California and Southern Oregon.



A Brief History of The State of Jefferson Written by Gail Jenner

Today's State of Jefferson refers to portions of Southern Oregon and Northern California. Originally this region represented the "second half" or "northern mines" of the famous gold rush of 1849-50, but it never received the kind of historical reference that the Sierra Mother Lode did, even though it contributed as much, if not more, to the coffers of the two states. Moreover, the region was easily overlooked after the gold rush, since it continued to be less populated and more rural than the remainder of the two states.

> Because the people who have settled along the northern boundary of California and the southern boundary of Oregon have always been of an independent nature, it seems fitting that this region has attempted, on numerous occasions, to create a new state, not just in name or principle, but in reality as well.

The principle is not a new one, however, but has its roots in the area's history. In 1852, a bill to create a new state died in committee. On Dec. 19, 1853, THE DAILY ALTA OF CALIFORNIA of San Francisco suggested that Northern California and Southern Oregon could both benefit if a 'new state' could be created. Some suggested it be called 'Klamath.' Others suggested the name "Jackson."

At a meeting held on January 7, 1854, in Jacksonville, Oregon, Lafayette F. Mosher spoke about a state of 'Jackson.' Unfortunately, as the son-in-law of General Lane, with well-known pro-slavery and anti-Indian beliefs, the proposed state's identity was tainted by prejudice and unfounded fear.

In 1854-55, the State Assembly tried to split California into three states: "Shasta" to the north, "Colorado" in the middle, and "California" to the south. But the Senate let the bill lapse. In 1877-78, some again pushed for "Shasta" in the north, but the U. S. Congress vetoed the proposal.

By the fall of 1941, most communities in and around the region were behind the idea of secession. In a contest held by the Siskiyou Daily News, the name "State of Jefferson" was officially born.

Several Oregon and California counties joined in. In order to garner attention, a protest was staged along Highway 99 near Yreka. Members of Yreka's 20-30 Club stopped cars and passed out a declaration and pledged to secede every Thursday until the State of Jefferson became recognized as a state.


The movement gained momentum and Stanton Delaplane won the Pulitzer Prize writing about the conditions leading up to The State of Jefferson's "official" secession. A gubernatorial race was held, complete with a parade and speeches and even a dancing bear, but then, on December 7th, 1941, the bombing of Pearl Harbor took precedence over the region's rebellion.

Even today, the dream lives on for this unrealized, some might even say, mystical State of Jefferson. With majestic Mt. Shasta at its heart, and the Cascades forming its backbone, the region's wild rivers and rugged peaks both isolate and, at times, insulate its residents from the more populated outside world. Ranching, mining and logging have been its traditional source of wealth, but now recreation and tourism compete as major industries.

But it's the people who reside here that make the greatest contribution to the character of this region we call The State of Jefferson.

DENNY BAR STORY

Etna's Denny Bar Company has been resurrected, and the business, still under construction, guarantees to be an attractive and exciting location for locals and visitors.

The brick building recently purchased is located in downtown Etna. Last known as the Scott Valley Drug Store, the two-story structure was originally built in 1880 by the Parker Campbell Company, which sold goods and merchandise to the miners and settlers of the 1880s.

In 1892, the second story became the site of the first high school north of Red Bluff, California, with an enrollment of 15

students. The second floor was also later used for public lectures, concerts, entertainment, as well as rooms for rent. In 1896, Campbell sold his interest in the store to A.H. Denny, forming the Denny Bar & Parker Co. A.H. Denny was a man of serious vision, having first entered the mercantile business circa 1866 in Callahan, 12 miles south of Etna. He also acted as a Wells Fargo agent, a Justice of the Peace, and was instrumental in establishing Etna's first bank as well as the Etna Library and, of course, the Denny Bar Company.

In 1900, the business was incorporated under the name "Denny Bar Co." and became part of the first chain of retail stores in all of California, boasting a total of 9 stores throughout Northern California. Denny Bar Co. operated its own pack train and contracted for mail and freight to be transported over the mountains to the large gold mines located across the area. The building still houses an operational, large walk-in safe that was used by Denny Bar Co. to safeguard gold purchased from the gold miners until transport could be arranged by Wells Fargo Stage Coach to the nearest banks in Sacramento. It is recorded that the early Denny Bar Co. traded goods and services for over \$1,000,000 when gold was less than \$30 per ounce.


It was the history of this building that inspired new owners Cole

and Tricia Laustalot and Sparrow and India Tang to purchase it. "Being able to do something for our hometown is exciting," cites Cole enthusiastically. With work progressing steadily, the partners see this move as an opportunity for them as well as the community and county. Denny Bar Co. will operate as a wood-fire pizza restaurant and a spirits distillery. It will be a family-friendly eatery as well as a great attraction for tourists and visitors. They hope to officially open this fall.

Discovering The State of Jefferson

The "hay track" was a common feature on old barns and was developed early in the 19th century. Hay was hoisted high into the barn—a dangerous job—via a series of pulleys and trolleys that ran along the top of the barn. The hay was then stored in the upper story of the barn, often called a hayloft. Trap doors were used to drop hay into the feeding racks or mangers below. The pitch on this barn reveals where the hay track extended out of the barn.

BARNS


Barns are historically fascinating. Built on farms and ranches, they serve many purposes. Although in Europe and the eastern United States, and occasionally in the Northwest, barns are often built of stone or limestone—at least in part—in the Far West and much of the plains, barns are generally made of wood. The Abidiah Taylor Barn in Chester County, Pennsylvania, dates back to between 1724-1744, making it one of America's earliest and most unique barn structures.

Typically barns are classified by their function. Many were used for both livestock and crop or grain storage, but many farms used silos or granaries to house grain rather than barns. In the early days, milking barns were a common type and even today, barns once used for milk cows have been adapted to other uses. Smaller barns are often referred to as sheds, but sheds are used much like barns; without a doubt, any storage place on a farm or ranch is of great

value! Sadly many have fallen into disuse or been abandoned.


Some barns were built to house teams of horses, thus titled "horse barns." Along with stalls for horses, there was a tack room where the bridles, collars, saddles, etc, were kept and, again, hay was often stored in the upper story. This is a 100+ year old horse barn that housed a dozen or more work horses in its day.





Perhaps the most "famous" of all our local barns is the State of Jefferson barn located along Interstate 5 just south of Yreka. The signage was painted by Brian Helsaple and others. Visitors look for this

landmark. Note: It is a great example of a pole barn.





History of Gilchrist, Oregon - Northern Klamath County



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"The Gilchrist Dam"

Of Gilchrist, Oregon's major structures the dam is the oldest and most defining since its location is what determined why the mill and town are located where they are. The dam that forms the mill pond determined the location of the mill and the town. Its location was decided by the rock face to which it is anchored. During September of 1919 the site was reported on to Ralph Gilchrist by Frank Dushau.

A preliminary sketch of the millpond was sent to Frank W. Gilchrist by B. V. Wright with a letter dated December 12, 1936. The pond was seventeen feet at its deepest point which was at the dam. The pond covered 50 acres and was 3,000 feet long. The embankment for the Klamath Northern Railroad, located on the pond's west side, did additional duty as a levee. Some filling was required on the northwest end of the bank where the mill was located. B. V. Wright described having to clear trees in order to establish the site lines he needed to survey the site for the millpond.

The Gilchrist Timber Company awarded the contract to build the dam for the millpond to Kern & Kibbe. The contract for the construction of the millpond dam was \$19,168 plus the cost of grouting the rock formation on which the dam was erected. No price was agreed upon for the cost of the grouting, since it was impossible to determine the magnitude of the grouting work until the construction of the dam commenced. Kern & Kibbe dispatched their equipment to Gilchrist, Oregon, on August 3, 1937. Their employees began arriving on the jobsite on August 5, 1937. A separate contract was entered into for clearing the millpond site of timber, brush, and stumps. The cost for clearing each acre of the millpond's 50-acre area, including removal of the stumps, varied from \$70 to \$80 an acre. Projected completion of the clearing of the pond and most of the mill site was set for autumn. James Applewhite was responsible for overseeing the work done by the contractors on the dam and millpond.

During the autumn of 1937 filling cavities found in the rock formation slowed the dam's completion. B. V. Wright was advised in a letter dated September 10, 1937, for Boar & Cunningham Civil Engineers, that Kern & Kibbe had failed to explore a cavity found in the foundation rock near the dam's center. The civil engineers advised B. V. Wright that no portion of the dam proper had been poured and that pouring had been delayed until the extent and number of the cavities had been determined. They further reported that the slab for the sluiceway had been poured and that the concrete for the sluiceway piers had been poured to a sufficient height that it was now possible to divert water through the sluiceway.

Prior to the beginning of October 1937, Ora F. Blay had entered into a contract to clear the millpond site for \$1,188. Other sections of the dam's foundation was ready for final inspection by the end of October 1937. The contractor had

reached solid rock and was clearing and preparing it for the pouring of the dam's concrete. A contract for clearing the site for the Gilchrist Timber Company's mill was awarded to J. H.



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Haner on October 30, 1937. In the same letter, he also cautioned Frank W. Gilchrist that he anticipated winter weather threatened to stop James P. Applewhite's plans to conduct a series of tests on the millpond's dam to confirm that it would hold back water. The plans for the dam, Frank W. Gilchrist informed B. V. Wright, included a fish ladder and that he was to test the dam by holding some water in the millpond. The dam was completed

before winter set in. The Gilchrist Mill pond remains one of Gilchrist's signature features.








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
