

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## HISTORY OF YREKA

## St. Mark's Church in Yreka

This charming church building (photo below) has had a long and distinguished life in Yreka with many of its former parishioners being the foremost leaders in the community for several generations. One will find "St. Mark's" on the corner of Fourth and Lane Streets in Yreka. The parish was originally known as the Church of Saint Lawrence and was constructed in 1880. If someone from that era would walk around town today, they would easily recognize this building. They may note a few changes and additions, but the basic structure is quite original. In 1885 the congregation changed their name to Saint Mark's. The first services of in this building were held in January of 1881. In 1886 a charming picket fence was constructed and surrounded the church and the church yard.

History tells us that the original price tag for the building and furnishings of the church was \$3,100. A local man, Cal Gentry, did the framing and building of the church as well as building the tower. The cost for the labor was \$1,400, the rest in materials. The walls of the building were constructed of







2 x 10 tongue and groove, stood up on end; there is no studding and no cap sheet. The roof is carried by seven arches. The exterior of the roof also had an unusual striped design in the shingles that can be viewed on vintage photographs. These original shingles, each hand carved and shaved at one end, served the church for 67 years according to historical writings. It was made of sugar pine and somewhat resembled the appearance of fish scales.

There was an original bell that hung in the bell tower that was hung by local builder, E. Ranous in 1886. It was reported to weigh about 350 pounds and gave a "clear sound of good tone." However, in November of 1900 this bell fell and news articles state it was replaced about a month later.

Originally the church was designed by a ship's architect, William S. Moses, and the original interior of the building appeared like an inverted ship's hull. The church stood in its original condition until a severe roof fire in January of 1962. The congregation restored the church in September of that same year, but modified the interior walls somewhat; however, the exterior of the building was not significantly changed.


It was on January 1, 2011 that St. Mark's Episcopal Church officially closed. It was a difficult and painful decision on the part of the congregation and Northern California Episcopal Diocese, but ultimately unavoidable. It shortly followed that the Yreka Committee for Historic Preservation began discussions with the Diocese on acquiring the property. Although the charming church is no longer used by a single religious order, it continues to serve the community as not only a place of worship on Sundays but as a meeting place for Preservation, a place for weddings and memorial services, as well as a place for musical endeavors and other community activities.

Visitors are welcome to stop by St. Mark's Preservation Square and take a little historical tour of this delightful building on any day when services are not being held. Yreka Preservation is in the process of developing a research center in the former Rectory (house) adjacent to the church building. St. Mark's Preservation Square is an active and interesting place!

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## Discovering The State of Jefferson

## The Early Brewery in Grants Pass, Oregon

In 1886, a brewery opened in Grants Pass where Front Street, or "G" Street, crossed Gilbert Creek. Grants Pass was a small but thriving community then, most important as a railroad stop. The Southern Pacific Railroad depot was built along the tracks right in the middle of what is now 6th Street. Settlers from the Medford-Jacksonville area had to come to Grants Pass to catch the train or ship goods.

In 1885, when the city was incorporated and the county borders adjusted, Grants Pass was shifted from Jackson County to Josephine County and made the county seat of Josephine County.

When the brewery's well was drilled an abundant flow of water was tapped. It flowed freely with a superior quality that made it perfect for making high quality beer. In fact, the Rogue River Weekly Courier reported that the water appeared as if it was "heavily charged with carbon, with an unbelievable clearness, that caused it to sparkle like a thousand stars."

In January 1887, William Neurath & Co. was granted a malt liquor license by the City of Grants Pass, County of Josephine, thus the brewery was legally open for business.

In 1892-93, however, the brewery closed down and did not reopen until 1902. In the interim, the brewery building was used as an apple packing plant. Then, in January of 1902, the wood structure was destroyed by fire.

Owners Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Kienlin immediately began construction of a new brick building. In September 1902, the building was nearly finished. New brewing equipment was also purchased and installed and a brewer from Germany hired. Three months later Kienlin installed a handsome bar and began brewing.

Maria Theresa Kienlin was described as a lively and energetic woman. She was round, short, and well built. She owned several brightly colored parrots and it was common to see them all around the brewery or even perched on her shoulders.

During prohibition, the brewery was converted into a grocery store and bakery, still owned and operated by Maria Kienlin after her husband, Eugene, passed away in 1904.

She continued to work the business and in 1933, applied for but

She continued to work the business and in 1933, applied for, but never received, a license to once again brew beer. But Maria Theresa Kienlin died in 1934, at age 78. She didn't live to see a new enterprise take shape.

Finally, in 1975, three weeks before a planned demolition, it was rescued and in 1976 was reopened as a popular restaurant. Still called The Brewery, the eatery specializes in prime rib, steaks, fresh seafood, and pasta. It stocks a fully licensed bar and carries a large selection of microbrews. Call 541-479-9850 for more information.

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

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


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## 'Food That's Gold"

Stenhammar Cookies

Lavender, is known as the herb of royalty, the herb of soothing relaxation and generating a good immune system. The ancient written texts tell of its uses throughout time and the joy it brought the people. King Charles VI of France had cushions strewn about his rooms so that when one sat, it would perfume the air. Queen Elizabeth the I, had lavender incorporated into the table salt to sprinkle on meats. It also found its place in the baking department to lavish on cakes, scones, and even the honey laced lavender to add to the assorted teas of the day.

Here in Siskiyou County we have wonderful lavender fields to enjoy. The beauty of the view out at the Lavender Farms is breath taking. What an award winning photo op to enter in the Golden Fair this August.

If you have a stand of Lavender in the yard be sure to pick a nice bouquet this month. To make Lavender Sugar, rinse the bouquet under slow running cold water and shake it dry over some paper towels. Allow the little brackets that fall off the stems to dry in a quiet spot. Find a plastic container with a lid and start with 1 cup of granulated sugar. Spread a liberal tablespoon of the lavender brackets over the sugar in layers and continue in this fashion until the container is full. Allow it to sit for several days and open to enjoy this delightful infused sugar.

These cookies make a wonderful Christmas present to place in a colorful glass container or a little tin box. Add the recipe for the Stenhammar Cookies and it is sure to be a hit.

#### **Stenhammar Cookies**

Oven Temperature 350 degrees

- 1 ½ Cups unsalted butter, room temperature
- 3 Cups all purpose Flour (use 2 ½ Cups if incorporating more almonds)
- 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2/3 Cups dried Cranberries or dried favorite such as currents or raisins Chef's Note: (I like to use ½ cup of almonds as part of the flourgrind them with a little of the flour so it will not turn into paste.)

#### **Topping:**

½ Cup of ground almonds

1 Cup of the Lavender Sugar (instructions above)

Combine all the ingredients, kneading lightly. Divide into 6 pieces and roll into finger size thick ropes.

Place on a greased or parchment paper lined baking sheet. Flatten slightly. Brush with beaten egg and sprinkle with chopped almonds and the Lavender Sugar.

Bake on the center oven rack for around 15 minutes. Cut into 1/4 inch wide diagonal slices while still warm.

## **DUNSMUIR HISTORY**

#### THE BRIDGES

There are actually three bridges. The spans that cross the Sacramento River, the railroad, and the deep canyon are best seen from underneath. Walk under them today and as you look up you can understand how they have evolved

The story goes back to 1855 when Ross and Mary McCloud bought property known as Upper Soda Springs in the vicinity of what is now Tauhindauli Park. They built a rustic inn which evolved into an elegant hotel. As a stagecoach stop it attracted many visitors to enjoy the scenery, fishing, hunting and the soda water. Shortly after buying the property, Ross McCloud built a wooden toll bridge slightly downstream from the present Interstate bridge. In 1886 the railroad established a stop upstream from the toll bridge. A footbridge crossed the river there for access to the Upper Soda Springs Resort.

Then in 1915 construction began on an arched bridge which would carry the heavier automobile traffic of Highway 99 following what is now Dunsmuir Avenue. That triple span two lane bridge was designed by master engineer Harlan D. Miller who was at the height of his career in bridge design. His graceful reinforced concrete arches all along the state highway system were things of beauty. Completion of the bridge in 1916 was cause for celebration as North Dunsmuir and South Dunsmuir were connected. A pedestrian walkway was added in 1929.

The bridge however, was inadequate to handle the increasing automobile traffic. It was widened in 1953-55 by the addition of a parallel structure on the upstream (west) side. The pedestrian walkway was eliminated and the two parallel bridges supported a four lane roadway. The new structure was nearly identical to the 1916 bridge with three graceful curved arches. It is the bridge we see today looking toward the east.

Then in 1964-65 the original 1916 bridge was removed and replaced by a more modern square-arched bridge on the downstream side of the 1955 bridge. This is why the Interstate bridge looks so different when viewed from the east side. At the same time, the modern Dunsmuir Avenue bridge – the "800 Foot Bridge" - was built upstream (west) of the Interstate bridge. Major construction took place to create on-ramps and off-ramps and to straighten Dunsmuir Avenue as we know it today.

There is an echo of the 1916 bridge under the Interstate today although thousands of drivers pass over it and never know.

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



## What IS The State of Jefferson? By Gail Jenner

Today's State of Jefferson refers to portions of Southern Oregon and Northern California. Originally this region represented the "second half" or "northern mines" of the famous gold rush of 1849-50, but it never received the kind of historical reference that the Sierra Mother Lode did, even though it contributed as much, if not more, to the coffers of the two states. Moreover, the region was easily overlooked after the gold rush, since it continued to be less populated and more rural than the remainder of the two states.

The name Jefferson was selected after Yreka's local paper, The Siskiyou Daily News, ran a contest. J. E. Mundell of Eureka, California, submitted the winning name. A seal was created: a gold mining pan etched with two Xs to signify the double-cross by Salem and Sacramento politicians. Today the seal is still used on flags, banners, and State of Jefferson memorabilia.

Because the people who have settled along the northern boundary of California and the southern boundary of Oregon have always been of an independent nature, it seems fitting that this region has attempted, on numerous occasions, to create a new state, not just in name or principle, but in reality as well.

Even today, the dream lives on for this unrealized, some might even say, mystical State of Jefferson. With majestic Mt. Shasta at its heart, and the Cascades forming its backbone, the region's wild rivers and rugged peaks both isolate and, at times, insulate its residents from the more populated outside world. Ranching, mining and logging have been its traditional source of wealth, but now recreation and tourism compete as major industries.

It is the people who reside here that make the greatest contribution to the character of this region we love, proudly called The State of Jefferson. ◆

## GARDENING TIDBITS

Containers full of herbs to enhance your recipes, growing on your patio, window sill or deck, could quite possibly be the most valuable items in your garden. Even if you have acres of land, it is really great to be able to pick a handful of fresh grown

herbs from your own beautiful container garden, right outside your kitchen door! Some favorites to keep close at hand in large pots or wooden oak or redwood barrels are rosemary, mint, thyme, basil, oregano and chamomile.

**Rosemary:** Hardy perennial. Doesn't like a ton of water and prefers to dry out between waterings. Rosemary loves its own container.

<u>Mint:</u> Hardy perennial. Loves plenty of water and well drained soil. Growing in containers keeps it from spreading everywere!

<u>**Thyme:**</u> Perennial. Needs only minimal watering. Thrives in a container environment.

**<u>Basil:</u>** Annual. Loves plenty of water to keep its fleshy stems and tender leaves plump.. A most rewarding herb!

<u>Oregano:</u> Easy to grow perennial. Mature plants don't need much water.

<u>Chamomile:</u> Perennial. Lovely herb to dry for a calming soothing tea. Loves growing in full sun.

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



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## Treats for Chickens

Kelp is a valuable supplement that provides vitamins, minerals, amino acids and carbohydrates that in general, improve the overall health of chickens. Kelp meal can be fed to baby chicks right after hatch and thorough out the lifetime of the flock.

Many of the minerals include: calcium, magnesium, nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium, sodium, sulfur, cobalt, copper, iodine, iron, selenium.

Vitamins include A, B1, B6, (NIACIN), B12, D, E, and K.

Lastly kelp contains 21 amino acids to include lysine, hystidine, and proline.

By adding kelp to your flocks regular intake at the rate of 1-2% (1/4 cup per 11 lbs of feed or 1/4 tsp per gallon of fresh water) you can expect:

- increased hatchability of eggs
- reduced blood spots and increased golden yolk color;
- reduced coccidiosis outbreaks
- bright glossy plumage
- strong development of bone structure
- increased weight gain and overall alertness.

Additionally, kelp provides uniform shell texture and structure to maintain proper intestinal flora and bacteria. By adding small amounts of kelp to your poultry's diet, they will gobble up less food and show an improved overall health, with fewer diseases.

Not only can we as humans benefit, but chickens and their eggs do as well (in fact, gardens veggies, house plants, composts, and feeble soil can too)!

Feeding your chickens kelp is sort of like feeding vegetables to kids. Some may like it, but chances are they won't snap the granules out of the palm of your hand as they would a worm or piece of fresh zucchini, but certainly try (trying is always worth the chuckle and amusement). Sprinkle a little into the palm of your hand, call your flock, and watch how they respond. Like many new foods, one or two may try it and give you a what-the-hell-is-this look, followed by scratching the ground for something more appealing. Don't worry, you haven't broken their trust. There's not a doubt in my mind that if you called them back they would come flying on over for that worm or zucchini.



## The Five Volcanoes of The State of Jefferson

Mount Thielsen or Big Cow Horn Elevation 9,184 feet Klamath County, Oregon Last Erupted: 250,000 years ago Mount Thielsen Wilderness Area




Mount Thielsen is sometimes referred to as the "Lightning Rod of the Cascades." It's an extinct shield volcano previously inhabited by Chinook Native Americans, and was referred to as "Hischokwolas." The mountain was named after Jon Hurlburt, a Polish Explorer. The spire-like shape of Thielsen attracts lightning strikes which forms an unusual mineraloid called fulgurite. Fulgurites are natural hollow glass tubes formed in quartzose sand, silica or soil by lightning strikes.


Lassen Peak is located in the volcanic mountain area to the east of Redding, California. Native Americans called this area home long before white settlers ever saw Lassen. The series of minor to major eruptions occurred between 1914 and 1921. Many homes along area creeks were destroyed.



The 5th highest peak in California, Mount Shasta has the most volume of the stratovolcanoes in the Cascade Volcanic Arc. The Karuk Indians call her Uytaahkoo or "White Mountain." Theodore Roosevelt once said: "I consider the evening twilight on Mount Shasta one of the grandest sights I have ever witnessed." Shasta is home to seven named glaciers, and has erupted on average once every 600 years during the past 4,500 years.

## Dana's Lovely 1st Visit to Stewart Mineral Springs Retreat

I can hear it now, at the old folks home I'll never live in . . . "So, how did you celebrate *your* 50th birthday Dana? Swilling expensive champagne at that divine restaurant. You know the one, down on the bay ... *Ummm, not exactly.* "Oh, knowing you as well as I do. You were dancing on tabletops again to that rapping noise like you did in your 20's?" *Ahhh, that was Stevie Ray and it was on the bar, not a ....* "Oh I know now, you looked up that Brazilian cabaña boy and danced naked on the beach . . ." *I jabbed Ruthie's chair with my hiking boot. Let me tell you another story...* 

Last year, I turned 50. I'm not sure how *that* happened as I was only 48 the previous year. That is until my sister did the math and pointed out yes I was 50. Argh! What happened to 49? Since the auspicious day was only one month away I had to move quickly to plan something special, so I hit the internet.

Too late to place a trip to abroad, I focused on something closer to home. I surfed to some of my favorite retreat sites. Nothing felt right. I expanded my search with a more generic description of mineral springs in California. As I scrolled through the familiar places until one jumped out; Stewart Mineral Springs Retreat in Shasta. Huh, this is new. As I clicked from page to page I thought "How did I miss this place?" I've been going to hot springs for over 30 years. From natural mud baths in Montana, to underground caves in Colorado, to remote locations in Arizona, I've had amazing experiences. Yet here was a new adventure in the making. One page really caught my eye; Native American sweat lodge. I checked the calendar and saw that a sweat was actually scheduled on my birthday. It's always dicey booking reservations from web site photos and descriptions alone but this place just felt right.

The short drive off I-5 took me through dehydrated, late summer fields and into a lush, forested valley. I followed my map to the end of the road and stopped before a small sign saying Stewart Mineral Springs, Welcome. I'm always amazed at the stillness I experience after being on the road for hours. Stepping from the car, I stretched, taking several minutes to look around. The fragrant pines were an immense welcome to my senses after the drive. Around me were several rustic buildings and I could hear the gurgle of the creek nearby. So far, so good!

Check-in was easy and the people were nice. They informed me that the last bath was in 15 minutes, "Would you care to take a bath?" the receptionist asked. I wasn't exact sure what their definition of a 'bath' was but after a six hours in an air conditioned car, there was nothing I'd like better than to get naked in hot water. The sweat lodge ceremony was the next day at 6 pm she told me as I headed toward

my lodgings. Number 13 stood alone, nestled in the trees. From his roof perch, a stellar jay watched me unload my bags and walk up the stairs. 'Hello you too' I said as I turned the key in the lock.

I schlepped the rest of my bags, food, and well-traveled, red teapot to the cabin. After depositing the goods in the fridge, I poked around the bathroom and bounced on the bed. Everything was clean, tidy and obviously well-maintained. I was very pleased to see a small, wood stove but decided that it would be unnecessary this late summer and draped my grubby travel clothes on it.

Comfortable in my sweats, I headed to the bathhouse. I crossed over the creek on a wonderful, timber, walking bridge. I wanted to hang over the edge and let the moving water mesmerize me a bit but I'd have time later to check out the grounds. I was on a mission! Entering the bathhouse through the gift shop, I was greeted by an attendant. She took my bath coupon explaining the bath experience. First, I was assigned a private room with a clawfoot bathtub. She briefly left to fill the tub and then we walked down one short wing to a large, wooden door that she opened. I was immediately engulfed in hot, fragrant air. I peeked inside and saw a windowed firebox at the back of the sauna. Flames were dancing around several logs and the embers provided a soft glow illuminating a large, bench lined room. Aromatic cedar filled my lungs as we closed the door. After the bath and sauna, she suggested a plunge in the pool. Pool? What pool? She led me to the outside deck and pointed to the large, natural rock-walled pool that had been crafted in the creek. I noticed a sign on the wall with today's water temperature, 53 degrees. The plunge won't take long, I thought as I headed back to my room.

I lit the candle provided and slid into the bath. The water was divine and a perfect temp-



## Deep Pit Eats from a Backroads Backyard

"If more of us valued food and cheer and song above hoarded gold, it would be a merrier world." – J. R. R. Tolkien

As I peered out of the hole I was digging I realized that soon I would be speaking Chinese if I continued. Thankfully, I finally hit bedrock, actually hardpan but it sure felt hard as bedrock! I threw out the pick, shovel and last but not least my body. Looking into the hole, I had a sense of accomplishment, ownership. This was my hole, my Deep Pit BBQ hole. Five feet long, three feet wide and two and a half feet deep. It was supposed to be three feet deep but hardpan rescued me from the last six inches.

I have never seen or cooked in a Deep Pit BBQ but we were planning our annual family and friends gathering. Additionally, we would be celebrating my wife's birthday, a milestone birthday. I decline to say which one as I am a man of discretion, valor and self-preservation. But we wanted to do something new and different so we decided on the Deep Pit BBQ.

I performed my perfunctory internet searches including Hawaiian style, Fijian style, cowboy style and YouTube video clips of this type of BBQ. I gathered tips from Nick Branson at BNG Finish Products who was remodeling our kitchen and Jim Hauser from Siskiyou Distributing who has lots of experience with Deep Pit BBQ. Michelle and I gathered lava rock from the east side of Jefferson Country and friends Earl and Billie Rainwater from Dana provided the black oak. Banana leaves and meat came from Siskiyou Distributing, also burlap and a wire basket made to fit the hole rounded out our provisions.

At midnight the night before our dinner we filled the hole with newspaper and kindling and set it ablaze. As the fire burned we added larger pieces of oak. As the coals accumulated we dropped in the lava rocks and added still more oak. We drank beer and watched the fire burn down. About 3:30 in the morning we had about 16 inches of coals and glowing red lava rocks. Everything was laid out and ready. You have to act quickly as you place a layer of wet burlap over the hot rocks, drop in the wire basket, place the banana leaf and wet burlap wrapped meat in the basket, cover with a heavy layer of banana leaves, then with steam billowing from the pit, cover the hole with metal or wet plywood. We dropped a tarp over the plywood and covered it with the dirt from the hole.

You have to make sure there is no smoke or steam escaping from your pit. If oxygen enters the pit, combustion occurs and you open your pit 12 hours later to find nothing but ash instead of the main course.

Twelve hours later we opened the pit. This is an event with everyone gathered around for the unveiling. We are either champs or chumps with six bone-in pork roasts, one goat and one whole turkey for everyone's main course on the line!

Cut off the burlap and open the banana leaves.....the steaming meat falls away from the bones! Tender, moist and fantastic! With this venture, we are champs!

erature. With my 6-foot body completely submerged in the large tub and I felt like I was enveloped in warm, velvet. Blissed out, I gently floated and let the day's travel evaporate. Before I completely felt my toes shrivel inside out, I wrapped a sheet around me and headed to the sauna. Typical of most saunas, the large room had two tiers of wooden benches for sitting or reclining. Even though there were several other bathers present, I had space to stretch out and breath the cedar-scented air. People respectfully came and went. Soon, it was my turn to leave the glow of the sauna and head for my plunge (I love that word!).

I'm generally not anxious about jumping into brisk, river water but after baking myself, I decided the quick plunge approach was wiser than the slow, squinching, method. One swift dunk in the two foot rock pool and several refreshing but pathetic breast strokes across took my breath away. I crawled out on an adjoining bench to catch the sun. The drum beater was Walking Eagle, elder tribesman of the Karuk and leader of the sweat lodge ceremony.

I was thinking, are you kidding? I'm the one honoring you and this amazing ceremony. Thank you, it is my honor as well, I replied.

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I left Stewart Springs several days later. The mineral waters had worked their enchanting magic and I felt balanced and at peace. Between the baths and the sweat, both body and spirit had been purified in a most meaningful way.

As I write this, I am once again feeling a deep connection with the land and the magical, healing waters of the springs. Perhaps it's time to celebrate the lost 49th year with another visit...

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
