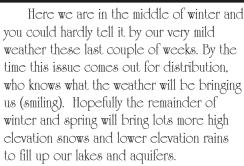

### HISTORY OF YREKA Yreka's Agricultural Hall

The Agricultural Hall in Yreka once sat at the southeast corner of Center and Fourth Streets. Today the area is used as a parking lot for Siskiyou County Title. The building was used for 45-50 years and was then torn down. It is estimated to have been built around 1910. Prior to this structure there was an earlier building used for the Agricultural Hall that was one block south on Fourth Street. It also served as the offices for the Agricultural Commissioners for a while after the large "public" hall had been built. It was actually the building that was once

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once used for a number of years as a jail, and then later the building housed the County Library for many years. Today the Law Offices of Newton and Newton occupy the land where the first Agricultural Hall operated.

The Agricultural Hall helped serve the large horticultural needs that Siskiyou County had and the commissioner would instruct new settlers about local growing practices and help provide them with the newest information on profitable methods of farming. Even though Yreka and much of the area was built on the discovery of gold (and even continues to this day at some levels), agriculture has served as a major industry for most of our history. At one time in our area we had some of the largest orchards in California, and fields of wheat, oats, and barley were abundant. An interesting fact to note is that in 1915, Siskiyou County had 271,914 acres of public lands awaiting future homesteaders for agricultural purposes. In other words: there was land for free!

The Agricultural Hall was a very active building in Yreka and was used for many community activities. During the fair, agricultural exhibits were set up in the hall and displayed for fair visitors before there was a permanent fairground. Many dances were held here and numerous news articles mentioned the Agricultural Hall as the place they were held! The community hosted dinners and get-togethers here, and even one of the ladies library groups held several events when raising money for the Carnegie Library funds. In World War, I a dinner and musical concert event was held here for the Siskiyou County draftees before they headed off to fight the war to end all wars.



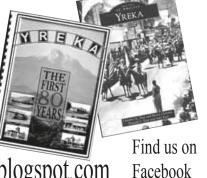

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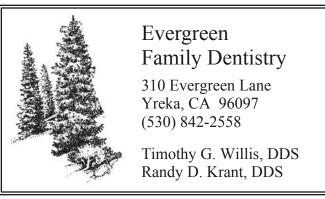

The image (lower right side of Page 2) is from a postcard that was mailed in 1913 to a woman in Oakland from Anna Gillis. In the correspondence she mentions the picture is of the Agricultural Hall and she said "it is great!" At the time it was a new building and locals were full of civic pride. In 1915, Siskiyou County promoted this hall in its special publication that was given out at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco. It is sad to note that in its later years the building was simply used for storage by our local Montgomery Ward store (Ward's was directly in front of Agricultural Hall) and then the once lively building that saw so many events and people within its walls became a parking lot.

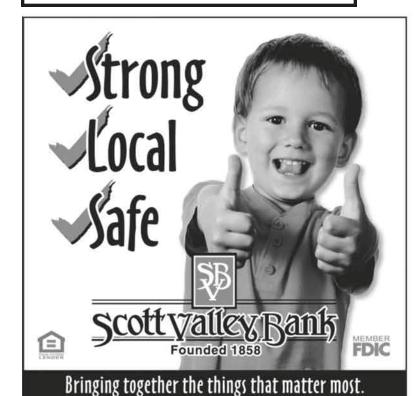


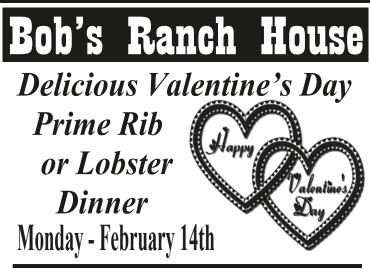






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Highland Mine Crew on Skiis. Salmon Summit, c. 1900s.

## Discovering The State of Jefferson

#### Winter Storms by Gail L. Jenner

Follow along with Gail each month and enjoy another new story of the many historical towns and areas found scattered throughout The State of Jefferson.  $\land \&$ 

As we look out and realize the kind of winter we started out with —with more storms than we've experienced in several years—it's interesting to go back and look at past, truly infamous winters.

The winter of 1861-1862 was one of the worst in the Siskiyou County's early history. It began in November of 1861 and, by January 1862, snow lay 15 feet deep on Scott Mountain, waylaying travelers for three days. High water took out nearly all the bridges between Shasta [near Redding] and Weaverville, while Crescent City was almost entirely destroyed. Rain and melting snow raised the Klamath River to 37.5 feet above normal. Yreka Creek overflowed its bank, washing out the bridge and washing away much of the town. Scott River flooded the valley and the entire region became a lake. Bridges, roads, ditches, and mining claims all fell victim to the floods.

Wells, in his HISTORY OF SISKIYOU COUNTY, recorded, "Klamath River was a raging torrent, the angry waters lashing the sides of their rocky prison and beating themselves into foam in their frenzy."

But that was only the beginning. He continued, "A week later, the rains descended and the floods came [again]." Even the wire bridge spanning the Klamath, "near the mouth of Salmon River, and ninety feet high, although under water, resisted nobly until the logs and driftwood brought down by the flood overcame it, and it went the way of all bridges...On Salmon River, every dam, bridge, mill and flume was washed away or badly damaged, the loss from Sawyer's Bar to the Klamath being estimated at \$90,000."

Regarding Scott Valley, Wells wrote: "The river carried everything in its path, including several buildings, while at Etna, the saw-mill went down the stream and the water-wheel of the flour-mill was borne away... The water of Indian Creek forced its way through Hooperville, causing many to abandon their houses and flee for safety, while nearly every vestige of mining operations was obliterated... McAdams [River] conquered everything but the Steamboat claim, and, shifting its channel, went tearing through the town of Hardscrabble, at least ten feet deep."

Another such winter was the winter of 1889-1890. In Klamath country, the snow was so deep that on the Spencer place, "the roof caved in, killing Grandma Spencer." According to a YREKA JOURNAL report, "a group of volunteers went to Spencer Creek from Keno to bring out the body, and it took several days to cover the five miles. The faithful Spencer dog would lie on the sled with the body each night."



## Discovering The State of Jefferson continued . . .

In order to feed cows, farmers broke through the ice twice a day with six-horse teams. Unfortunately, sometimes after breaking the ice on the river, the animals bunched up and went under. Just over the California border, more than 6,000 head of cattle died from starvation. Again, according to the YREKA JOURNAL, "A man named Harvey Teters, living near Keno, put a saddle on one of his cows, and went through five feet of snow to Linkville (Klamath Falls) to get supplies for his family of fourteen...it took him several days to make the trip. He was a newcomer and had not time to get ready for the winter."

Another infamous winter was in 1964, the year of one of the 'great floods'. (see photo at right) It had been exactly 9 years since the devastating floods of 1955. On the first day of winter, warm rain melted the snow pack. Creeks overflowed and Scott River was rising.

In the middle of Scott Valley, Betty Young and her husband Bob went to tend the water but "we couldn't find the ditches, the water was so high it resembled a huge lake with trees growing up through the water."

Where normal rainfall amounts to 3.56 inches in Callahan, in December 1964, 14.63 inches fell. In Happy Camp, 30.39 inches fell. Sawyer's Bar collected 25.84 inches that year and Seiad, 28.11 inches. The river gauges recorded readings that crested from two to 11 feet higher than readings taken during the 1955 flood.



The stores at Somes Bar and Forks of Salmon were washed away. Another slide took out 300 feet of Scott River Road, and on Salmon River, 100 yards of highway was lost. In all, 41 Siskiyou County bridges were taken out and dozens of roads either destroyed or damaged.

Then, on Christmas Day, it began to snow. By January 5th, 30 inches blanketed Scott Valley. Sawyer's Bar reported 24 inches, and Happy Camp reported 12 inches. Highways were closed 100 miles south of Siskiyou County. • That's all for now!

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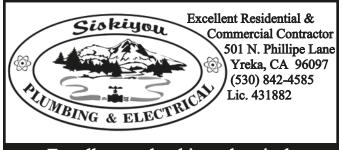


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## Cooking in a Dutch Oven It's Fun, Easy and the Food Tastes Great!

#### What is a Dutch Oven?

The Dutch Oven is a cooking vessel that is cast in iron. It has been around since the 16th Century. The Netherlands manufactured a type of Dutch Oven called a "Potjie" - pronounced "Poe-key." These castings were mainly sold in Africa. Starting about the 17th and 18th Centuries, England became involved in the process and manufacture of Dutch Oven castings and began distributing products

to the Americas. The Dutch Oven was known as a Cooking Vestal or a Pot and later a Bake Oven. The Dutch moved into the Pennsylvania area and sold them as Dutch Ovens (Pennsylvania Dutch). There are two types: the "Camp Dutch Oven" and the "Kitchen Dutch Oven." The Camp Dutch Oven was the original. It has 3 legs on the bottom of the pot and a slightly domed lid. It has a ½ inch flange around the top side of the lid which keeps the charcoal or wood ash from dropping into the pot.

The Kitchen Dutch Oven came to us in the late 1850s when the cast iron cooking range was brought into our homes. The Kitchen Dutch Oven has no legs on the bottom and has a high domed lid. There are ¼ inch spikes and round cycles casted under the lid. These devices are to allow moisture to collect and drip back to the food being cooked (the definition of self-basting). Your mother or grand mother probably has one stored away or still uses it! Dutch Ovens are great for cooking and are considered to be the very first crock pot! Either inside your kitchen oven or on your stove top, Dutch Ovens cook wonderful stews, soups, sauces, or ANYthing!

Yes, a good Dutch Oven is a little expensive but they will last for generations. I have a Dutch Oven that was made in 1900 and it is still working just fine! Whatever you can cook in your oven or on your kitchen stove, you can also cook in a Camp Dutch Oven outdoors on an open fire! • See you next month!

## GARDENING TIDBITS

This time of year, we can only dream of pretty spring flowers and the beautiful spring weather that is lurking outdoors in our not so distant future. When we get these crazy winter warm spells up here in the sticks, like the past couple of weeks in January, it really toys with us - creating the fun and frustrating Spring Fever we are all so fond of!

A wonderful way to bring some SPRINGTIME into your winter homes is to "force" a few of your outdoor dormant tree and shrub branches into flowering INdoors.

Now that we are into February, our trees and shrubs have been exposed to enough "cold" weather that will allow them to bloom when they are "tricked" by the warmer temperatures inside our homes.

The best varieties of branches to use for forced indoor flowering are redbud, magnolia, forsythia, pussy willow, lilac, crab apple, cherry, pear or apple.



First, on a mild day in above freezing temperatures in February or March, select some mature, pencil thick branches from one of your trees or shrubs that appear to have swollen plump buds. Cut your branches at an angle and make sure you cut them long enough to display in a vase. Prune off any tiny lower branches that would be submerged in the water of your vase. Gently smash the cut ends of the branches a bit with pliers or a hammer when you first cut them so they soak up the water easier. Immediately place these cut branches into a large vase of water and let them sit in a cooler area of your house, on a table or counter top out of direct sunlight. Do not let them dry out. Check the water level in the vase daily and change the water if it becomes cloudy. Mist them once a day.



Once the branches have gotten used to the warmer temperatures inside your home, the beautiful flowers will begin to open. This can take anywhere from one to six weeks, so be patient. The closer to their natural outside "bloom" date that you cut these branches, the sooner they will bloom indoors. This is a fun activity for the entire family.

Happy 25th Anniversary Mt. Shasta Ski Park! Opened on December 14th, 1985 the ski park celebrates 25 years of operation and community involvement this ski season.

Sitting on the southern flank of Mt. Shasta, a dormant stratovolcano, the base of this full service ski resort is at the 5,500 foot elevation with a summit elevation of 6,890 feet. At the top of Coyote Butte on a clear day the 14,179 foot mountain is a wonder to behold as it presides over skiers, snowboarders and the surrounding country, from the Sacramento Valley to the Oregon and Nevada borders then beyond. Redding lies a scant 65 miles to the south and Medford lies just 100 miles to the north. The views alone are worth the price of a lift ticket.

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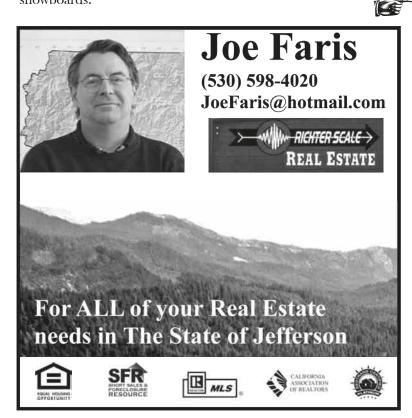
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With three triple chair lifts (Douglas, Coyote and Marmot) one surface lift and a conveyor lift, Mt. Shasta Ski Park is capable of moving up to 6,200 people per hour and accommodated 160,000 skiers during the 2009-2010 ski season. These folks enjoyed 425 acres of skiable terrain on 32 trails with a vertical drop of 1,390 feet and the longest run at 1.75 miles. Throw in a 300 foot Super Half Pipe and Terrain Parks for the beginner, intermediate and advanced and you have a mountain that provides for every level of adrenaline junkie.

If the 275 inches of annual snowfall is not enough, the park has snowmaking capabilities on 65 percent of its trails. Now mix 45 degree average daytime temperatures with an annual average of 275 days of sunshine and you have every reason to indulge in the mountain's offerings.

Ok, so now you want to partake. The hours of operation Thursday thru Saturday are from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and Sunday thru Wednesday 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Night skiing runs Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Should you need equipment, a full service rental shop is available with skis and snowboards.

If you are looking for a lesson to sharpen your skills or are just beginning, check out the Learning Center. You can obtain full packages which include lessons or you can sign up for group or private lessons. Forget something? The Mountain Shop retail store carries all the skiing and snowboard essentials. Everything you need is available on site!

Of course you will work up an appetite and Mt. Shasta Ski Park offers the Coyote Grill BBQ, BCs pizza and specialty coffees, the Powderhound Café and for those who don't want to leave the slopes you can grab a bite to eat at the outdoor Black Diamond Grill located at the top of Douglas Butte.

Your best way to enjoy the skiing at great rates is to watch for season pass specials usually offered in the off season. Grab them early for the best price. If you don't have a season pass, rates vary depending on what you need. The park offers lift tickets for half day, full day, nights, two day and three day passes. Check their website at www.skipark.com for a complete list of current rates.

Mount Shasta is one of 20 volcanoes forming the Cascade Arc in the Pacific Northwest. Only two exceed 14,000 feet in height, Mount Rainier at 14,411 feet and Mount Shasta at 14,179 feet. Mount Rainier is the highest in the chain and Mount Shasta the second highest. Twelve volcanoes rise above 10,000 feet. The Cascade Arc is a part of the Pacific Ring of Fire which encircles the Pacific Ocean and contains 75% of the world's volcanoes.

Historically, Mount Shasta has erupted approximately every 600 years with the last eruption occurring in 1786. The heaviest recorded snow storm occurred from February 13th - 19th, 1959 with the massive storm dropping 189" of snow on the mountain. That is almost 16 feet of snow from a single storm!

Early in this ski season Mt. Shasta was blanketed with an abundance of snow. As I write this in late January, we are experiencing our mid winter storm break with spring like conditions and a beautiful, sunny 50 degree day at the ski park. Winter will be back and skiing will continue until true spring with an anticipated closing date for the ski park of Sunday, April 17, 2011.

To head up the mountain and reach the ski park, exit I-5 on Hwy. 89 east towards the town of McCloud. Approximately 6 miles up the road at Snowman Summit, turn north on the Ski Park Highway and continue until you come to the end of the road at the ski park.

As with any ski park and winter-time travel, make sure you check weather and road conditions prior to leaving home. 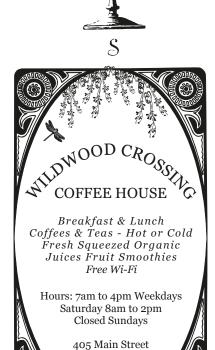

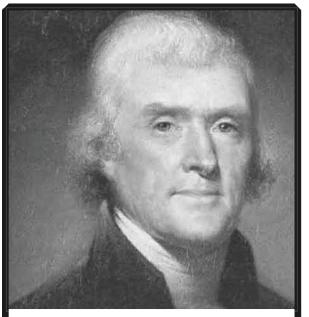

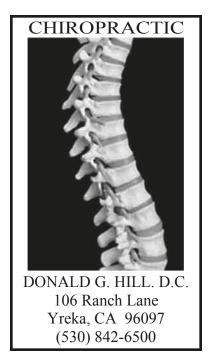
"Dependence begets subservience and venality, suffocates the germ of virtue, and prepares fit tools for the designs of ambition."

Tomas Jefferson - Lived from 1743 to 1826 He was the 3rd President of the United States and principal author of the Declaration of Independence. Today's State of Jefferson refers to portions of Southern Oregon and Northern California. Originally this region represented the "second half" or "northern mines" of the famous gold rush of 1849-50, but it never received the kind of historical reference that the Sierra Mother Lode did, even though it contributed as much, if not more, to the coffers of the two states. Moreover, the region was easily overlooked after the gold rush, since it continued to be less populated and more rural than the remainder of the two states.

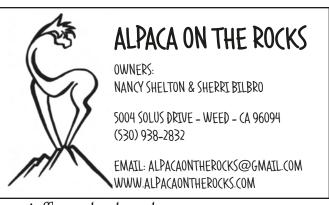
Because the people who have settled along the northern boundary of California and the southern boundary of Oregon have always been of an independent nature, it seems fitting that this region has attempted, on numerous occasions, to create a new state, not just in name or principle, but in reality as well.

Even today, the dream lives on for this unrealized, some might even say, mystical State of Jefferson. With majestic Mt. Shasta at its heart, and the Cascades forming its backbone, the region's wild rivers and rugged peaks both isolate and, at times, insulate its residents from the more populated outside world. Ranching, mining and logging have been its traditional source of wealth, but now recreation and tourism compete as major industries. It's the people who reside here that make the greatest contribution to the character of the region called The State of Jefferson.









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#### The Five Volcanoes of The State of Jefferson

Mount Thielsen or Big Cow Horn Elevation 9,184 feet Klamath County, Oregon Last Erupted: 250,000 years ago Mount Thielsen Wilderness Area



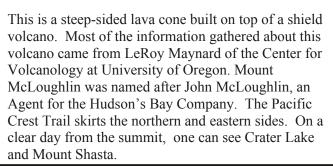
Mount Thielsen is sometimes referred to as the "Lightning Rod of the Cascades." It's an extinct shield volcano previously inhabited by Chinook Native Americans, and was referred to as "Hischokwolas." The mountain was named after Jon Hurlburt, a Polish Explorer. The spire-like shape of Thielsen attracts lightning strikes which forms an unusual mineraloid called fulgurite. Fulgurites are natural hollow glass tubes formed in quartzose sand, silica or soil by lightning strikes.

Lassen Peak

Lassen Volcanic National Park



Lassen Peak is located in the volcanic mountain area to the east of Redding, California. Native Americans called this area home long before white settlers ever saw Lassen. The mountain was named after Peter Lassen, a Danish blacksmith immigrant who settled in Northern California in the 1830s. Lassen is one of the world's largest plug dome volcanoes. The series of minor to major eruptions occurred between 1914 and 1921. Many homes along area creeks were destroyed.

Considered a sleeping giant, this is the largest volcano in the Cascade Range. This large shield volcano last erupted in 1065, forming near-by Glass Mountain. Medicine Lake's eruptions created rugged lava flows near Tulelake, California and Klamath Falls, Oregon which were used as convenient hiding places by the Modoc Indians during the Modoc War in the 1870s. Come and visit the incredible Medicine Lake area, Glass Mountain, and Captain Jack's Stronghold which is part of the Lava beds National Monument.

The 5th highest peak in California, Mount Shasta has the most volume of the stratovolcanoes in the Cascade Volcanic Arc. The Karuk Indians call her Uytaahkoo or "White Mountain." Theodore Roosevelt once said: "I consider the evening twilight on Mount Shasta one of the grandest sights I have ever witnessed." Shasta is home to seven named glaciers, and has erupted on average once every 600 years during the past 4,500 years.

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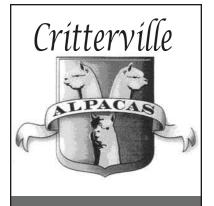
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#### MAP OF THE COUNTIES INCLUDED IN THE STATE OF JEFFERSON

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#### "PEPPERMINT TRUFFLES"

This is a delightful little truffle that is easy to make for the novice interested in making chocolates. Go ahead! Experiment with this recipe and get "chocolate fever!" Then come and join our classes at SCEDC-Harvest Food Center. (see AD for Cooking Classes on Pg 10)

6 oz. Unsalted butter (1 ½ sticks) at room temperature

1/3 Cup light Corn Syrup

1 pinch Salt

1 lb. Confectioners Sugar sifted

1 Cup of Brach's Individual Peppermint Candies crushed

1 tsp Peppermint Extract

2-3 drops red food color

Package White Bark Chocolate Bar for enrobing the truffles

- In a large bowl with mixer at medium speed or with a wooden spoon beat the butter, corn syrup and salt until smooth. It will expand and get warm.
- Add the flavoring and the color.
- Add the Confectioners sugar all at once, if using an electric mixer it will only mix part of it. Remove the mixture and knead by hand until all is incorporated.
- Shape the mixture into little balls while it is still warm.
- Melt the white chocolate bark according to instructions on the package in the microwave. Dip the little balls in the chocolate and then roll in the crushed peppermint candies.
- Keep in an airtight container and enjoy!



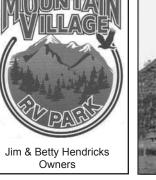

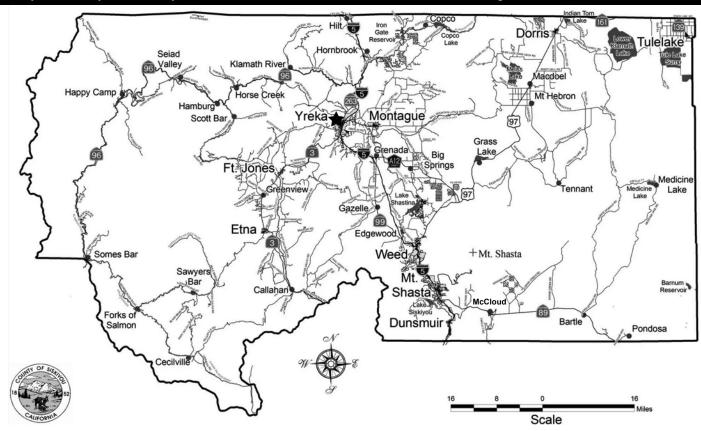

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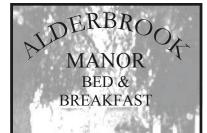
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
