We are honored to have found a few lovely local writers to share their unique and interesting historical research with all of us. Fascinating history from right here in our own backyard!










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#### Discovering The State of Jefferson: A Brief History of Fort Jones, California by Gail L. Jenner

At the northern end of Scott Valley, Mr. O.C. Wheelock established one of the most important trading centers in the area. According to Harry L. Wells, a cabin, first built in 1851, presumably by Brown & Kelley, was sold to Wheelock and company. It was Wheelock, however, who took over the trading post and house of public "entertainment." This station, also known at other times as Scottville, Scottsburg or Ottitiewa (which was the name of the Scott Valley branch of the Shasta Indians) was renamed Fort Jones in 1860, and was located beside what would become the major trail from Shasta (near Redding) to Yreka.

An interesting structure built in 1851, and still standing, was the Fort Jones House. In 1976, it was listed in the National Register of Historic Places. An important stage stop on the California-Oregon stage route, it was also a "pleasure house" used by soldiers garrisoned at the fort. The unique exterior was made to look like stonework.

Not far from Wheelock's stood Fort Jones. Named for Colonel Roger Jones, Adjutant General of the Army from 1825-52, it was garrisoned by Company E 4th U.S. Infantry in October 1852, under Captain (Brevet Major) Edward H. Fitzgerald.

In the beginning there were only a couple of log buildings with dirt floors, but by 1854, there were nine structures. General George Crook, who later gained fame during the Civil War, was stationed at Fort Jones. It is said that General Ulysses S. Grant and Phillip Sheridan were also assigned duty at Fort Jones but never arrived.

The fort was dismantled in 1858 (but not officially abandoned until 1866). Today nothing remains of the fort except a house that was moved into town and converted into a residence.

The first church in Fort Jones was the Methodist Church. Built in 1873 on the flat below Dr. Cabiness' residence, it was dedicated in June 1874. The Fort Jones Roman Catholic Church held its first services in a hall under the direction of Father Farley; construction of a church didn't begin until 1881 when Israel S. Mathews, one of Scott Valley's earliest pioneers, donated a piece of land. In 1893, the Fort Jones Episcopal Church was erected on the corner of Main and Sterling Streets. Unfortunately, membership declined and the building was sold to the city. It was later torn down.

Fort Jones prospered as merchants, ranchers, and miners prospered. The Diggles brothers built the first store and the first brick structure in the valley. Then, after parting company, Henry, in company with others, built the first steam flouring mills that serviced the valley and adjoining mining districts. Another enterprising pioneer was A. B. Carlock who established Scott Valley Bank, which remains the oldest continuous independent bank in California.

Along with a number of historic buildings along Main Street, such as the photo above, the flavor of Fort Jones' past continues to resonate for residents and visitors alike. Today Fort Jones remains one of the two principal towns in Scott Valley, and in 2010, will celebrate its "official" 150th Anniversary on Homecoming weekend in September. The Fort Jones' Museum will participate in the celebration and for those looking for more information on the museum, there is a new website: www.fortjonesmuseum.com.

Also, those looking for details on the upcoming 150th celebration, there will be details and information coming up in JEFFERSON BACKROADS, as well as in the local newspapers. It should be a great time to reconnect with Fort Jones and its history!

# Capps' Speakeasy

West-Mex Crusine & Hooch

Stroll into a delightful restaurant in Yreka called Capps' Speakeasy. Found on historically famous West Miner Street, Capps' is a place you can go to enjoy the historic atmosphere, the yummy food and of course the drink.

We wandered in on a Friday early evening to beat the crowds. Nice music tinkling in the background (which in my mind is a MUST for E V E R Y good restaurant we like to frequent) set the stage for our fun evening.

We started out with a nice cocktail and chips and salsa, seated where we could enjoy some of the historic photographs and articles adorning the many walls of the establishment. This building has been around since 1854!

Jeff Capps, Chef and Owner of Capps' Speakeasy, was born in the State of Jefferson, Grants Pass, Oregon to be exact. He moved to Yreka when he was a kid and ended up graduating high school here. He has been back and forth for a decade or two between Portland and Jacksonville, Oregon and also to Washington, D.C. Through those vears, he attended Portland's Western Culinary Institute and ran a Bed & Breakfast too. It's fortunate for us that he landed back here to open Capps' Speakeasy in the summer of 2009.

Ooops, back to dinner . . . I ordered the Prohibition Fettuccini with charbroiled chicken, while my husband had the Combination with Chile Relleno and Enchilada. Imagine a place I can have pasta and my hubby can have Mexican food! Another plus!

My loaded plate full of pasta had an amazing balance of sauteed mushrooms, crunchy pecans and tomatoes in a tasty Bourbon cream sauce. The parmesan cheese and green onions perfected the dish. My hubby's Mexican combination plate was plum overflowing with deliciously flavored bliss. Happily, we had leftovers and sadly we were

too full for dessert.

One of the most interesting pieces of history here took place on the brick patio out back. This is a fantastic place to sit and enjoy dinner and drinks on your pleasant summer evenings. Apparently during prohibition days, the brick building located on this patio was used as a sugar shack, which was a place they locked up sugar to keep the bootleggers from getting it to make moonshine! Fascinating!

Another venture that Jeff dabbles in is his famous Chili Butter! Reading the label just now, since I have a container of it in the fridge because it is DEELICIOUS, it is made of a smooth & sassy blend of creamy butter and zesty chilies. You can melt this chili butter onto popcom, slather it on corn on the cob, or use it to finish off some grilled chicken, seafood, steaks or veggies. He uses all natural ingredients and creates it here locally. You can pick it up right at the restaurant!

We highly recommend you come out to Capps' Speakeasy for lunch or dinner sometime soon. You can even hire out the restaurant for private functions.

## **HISTORY OF YREKA by Claudia East**

The Yreka City Park at the west end of the Historical District (corner of Miner and Gold Streets) has a bit of surprising history! Early on this parcel of land was used as the "Fairgrounds" when fairs and similar events were held in downtown. Referencing maps from the 1900s one finds there were corrals located at the area of the stone park entrance for livestock displays. In addition, during fairs and events, empty store fronts would also be used for fair displays. Circa 1910, a large Agricultural Hall and community center was built at the corner of Center and Fourth Streets and was also home to many of the fair events.

During the 1920s the county set aside money to purchase the land at the current site of the Siskiyou Golden Fairgrounds. There was a horse race track in the area and it was a HUGE event to have horse races during the fair for many, many years. It was one of the highlights of the day, and one of the main reasons the "fairgrounds" were purchased. The Gold and Miner Street fair area later turned into Yreka's Athletic Park.

On August 10, 1921 an article appears in the Yreka Journal explaining about an "Archway Going Up for Fair Ground" ~ this archway is what we see in this photo and on the corner of Gold and Miner. The Journal description gives information that was in the original design, but the actual finished entrance was less in overall size. Below is a portion of the article written about this archway.

An excerpt from the Yreka Journal, page 1, August 10, 1921:

"The fair ground entrance on the corner of Gold and Miner is progressing nicely. It will be in the form of a quarter circle, with a cobble stone wall three feet high, and a lawn fence wire four feet higher, and two cobble stones at each side of the center arch, the arch to be made of the building stone exhibited in an arch at the Panama Pacific Exposition in 1915. The stone having been gotten out in the Marble Mountain country and various sections of the country by Mr. J. B. Russell; who also polished the stone and went to San Francisco and built the notable arch that attracted universal attention and took the gold medal for the largest and best stone exhibit from any state or county. It is made up of marble, gray and black granite, onyx, jade, red rock sandstone, rhodennite, and various other stone....The first top stone will be engraved "SISKIYOU," above this is a coping and above that is a top pile on which will be chiseled, "YREKA PARK 1921."

The next time a visit to the park is in order, stop and examine this interesting structure and think about the history behind its origins! It is actually made up of stones from throughout the county of Siskiyou and portions exhibited at the Panama Pacific Exposition in 1915!

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



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# Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation: Projects in Jefferson Country

We residents of the State of Jefferson are well aware of, and look forward to, the RMEF Banquet held each spring in Yreka. The Siskiyou Chapter Committee for the RMEF is a hard working, dedicated group of volunteers who takes great pride in presenting a quality evening of fun, food, raffles and auctions. The Siskiyou Chapter's first banquet was held May 10th, 1997. Since that day they have had great support from the local community and particularly, the local businesses who donate to this cause year after year!

Folks are not quite as aware of the work that has been accomplished by the RMEF and its Partners here in Siskiyou, Trinity, Del Norte and Modoc Counties. After all, we do have a healthy number of elk right here in our backvard!

From 1998 thru 2008, RMEF has been a central figure in providing and enhancing wildlife and elk habitat on 68 projects mostly in Siskiyou County. Project costs funded by the Elk Foundation total \$1,451,256.00 with another \$5,264,343.00 provided by the Foundations partners. That is a whopping \$6,715,599.00 invested in our area for wildlife habitat improvement!!

A big "Thank You!" to the Siskiyou Committee, volunteers, local businesses, and all the folks who attend or donate to the banquet each year! And "Thanks" to the RMEF for investing in our wildlife! Nice job!

During 1990 Fish and Game transplanted 187 head of elk from Jewell Meadow in Oregon to the Marble Mountains. Later transplants were made from Davis Creek in Oregon to Trinity Center in Trinity County. This practice has since slowed due to concerns for the potential of spreading Chronic Waste Disease within the herds.

Since 1990, local elk have been captured, collared then released back in our area. The first collars had a GPS system tracking elk movement. These collars had to be recovered at a later time as all information gathered was maintained on the collar. Today these collars periodically upload their information to satellite where it is retrieved by wildlife officials. A couple of interesting facts were discovered about our elk. Seven elk were collared in the Shasta Valley. A small bull traveled 90 miles into Oregon and returned. A cow traveled to the Tulelake area, down to Canby, finally arriving on the north edge of the Madeline Plains between Alturas and Susanville. Fourteen months and 1700 miles later, she returned to the Shasta Valley! Additionally, it was discovered that Shasta Valley elk were using an area near Grass Lake for calving in the spring. This year four elk were collared near Happy Camp. There is limited wintering range in the Klamath River drainage and the interest is in discovering where these animals spend their time wintering.

In 1997 Siskiyou Chapter Volunteers worked at Orr Lake. In conjunction with RMEF, Ducks Unlimited, USFS and the California Wildlife Conservation Board, many things were accomplished. Existing fences were taken down, a small campground with pit toilets was developed and dikes and ditches were installed for proper water management.

There are a variety of ongoing projects in the area. They range from prescribed burns, invasive weed control, habitat improvement, installation of water guzzlers, habitat mapping and modeling, riparian fencing, winter range assessment and others. These projects can be found in the Marble Mountains, Klamath River drainage, Salmon River drainage, Cecilville, Petersburg, Shasta Valley, Scott Valley, Butte Valley, Trinity Center and Modoc County on the Devils Garden and the Warner Mountains. Remember these projects enhance habitat for all wildlife, not just elk!
