

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



Real Life Logging Stories by Hank Nelson of Wasilla, Alaska

#### "At The Circus"

In my eyes, Uncle Fred could do no wrong; he was good at just about anything and everything he put his mind to was shoulder to the wheel. The circus had come to town, a carnival... and Fred took me to see it. I held his hand and with the other I held tightly to my pink snow cone. We wandered here and there, taking in the sights. There was a lot to see and experience, if only vicariously, like riding the ponies on the Merry-Go-Round, the "loop the loop"... bumper cars and the Ferris Wheel. Lively carnival music, the classic circus Calliope, blared through strategically placed loud speakers to rev up the crowd and get them excited. It worked to perfection. I stood, fascinated, at the organ grinder turning the crank over and over, while the monkey, dressed in a tuxedo and wearing a top-hat, danced. "Okay, ladies and gents, step right up and watch the fat lady sing" and yet another, "Okay, see the bearded lady," and still another, "Whatdya say... whatdya say ... step right over here, watch Siegfried the Great, strongest man in the world, wrestle the Siberian Bear all the way from Russia... and come right in and watch the bevy of gorgeous, high stepping, tantalizing girls from Paree ... belles of the European Continent." We stood aghast and in utter amazement, we held our breaths as Marcos the Magician sawed a beautiful lady in half with a crosscut saw before our very eyes, only to see her reappear moments later from behind a veiled curtain! "Okay, step right up and see the giant two-headed snake from deep in the Amazon Jungle of South America. Hey kid, outa my way... see the ponies, no bigger than jackrabbits. See the ponies from deep down in the bowels of the Grand Canyon, see the circus clowns and a tall man on stilts, dressed in red, white and blue Uncle Sam outfit!" Gosh mighty, it was almost too much to see in one swell swoop! The Barker talked fast, spitting out words like a jackhammer and rapidity of a Tommy Gun. "Step right up, folks... and see Siegfried the strongest man in the world. He can lift anything with two ends on it and snap a railroad spike in two with his fingers like a pretzel."

Going to a carnival only came around once a year. Fred was an expert marksman, he knew how to shoot, to aim, steady yourself and breathe deeply and hold it... and then squeeze off a shot. We watched for a while as people lined up, paid for their tickets, aimed and fired. It looked like a cinch, but people kept missing. The rifles were 22 caliber bolt action rifles with open sights and chained and secured, so you wouldn't be able to walk off with them. It looked easy. Fred glanced down at me, smiled and said, "Hey, Buddy, what do you say we win ourselves a Cupie Doll for Grandma?" Fred looked the rifle over and then put his hand down in his pocket for a pocket knife, and with the end, gently tapped the back sight, just a little... and then took aim and fired.

He couldn't miss, it was a dead center hit every time. He had those yellow ducks a'twirling around on the string like leaves in a gale. People were crowding around just to watch Uncle Fred put on a show. But, the fellow behind the counter wasn't amused. He reached out and snatched the rifle out of Fred's hands. "Okay, fella, take your @#\$& Cupie Doll and get the hell outa here." Fred looked around and saw a couple of rough looking men with their arms folded across their chests watching him intently, who convinced Fred that sometimes discretion is the better part of valor. On the way home, he told me that you got to be careful in these fly-by-night carnivals. They hit town, fleece the yokels and then head for the next one. He went on to explain that most of the shows are legitimate, but here and there are a few that were unscrupulous-- shysters-- and had it rigged with shills, fellows who work for the carnival. They'd win and pretty soon people would crowd around to watch... and then the Barker says, "Okay, who wants to be next to win a prize for the little lady?" Then you try your luck, it looks easy, but somehow, no matter how good or how hard you tried, most of the time, you walk away empty handed. Of course, the carnies are smart enough to play the averages and let somebody win every now and then, otherwise no one would line up to win the prize and maybe show off a little for their girlfriends. It's the law of averages and vanity. "Always remember, Buddy, there's a sucker born every day." Fred figured that every boy ought to be able to take in a circus or a carnival so that later on in life he'd be able to sort things out, the real from the not so real.

The North Bend Bay Cantilever Bridge (now known as the Conde B. McCullough Memorial Bridge) was a thing of beauty and a marvel of engineering. Construction began in 1934. Uncle Fred worked on the bridge for a time. When it was completed in 1936, it was the longest bridge in Oregon. Heading north on the 101 Coast highway, the entrance was adjacent to the public park where Uncle Fred took me Easter Egg hunting each year. There was an opening celebration. The whole community and combined cities just three miles apart, became one. A big name dance band entertained the folks and a parade down Main Street ensued and the affair had a carnival-like atmosphere. For three whole days, there was something to see, hear and do for everyone... entertainment just around the corner, when you least expected it.


He laughed and said he sure did... but that it was all worth it for all the laughs he had over the years just thinking about it.








RUGGED AND BEAUTIFUL SISKIYOU COUNTY, CALIFORNIA







As we approach Christmas and the end of the year, many of us take stock of our lives, what we did and how we did throughout the ending year. Did we accomplish the improvements we thought were needed? Were we as kind to other people, animals or life in general as we would like to be? Did we start or learn something new to help us be more productive and better people. Always on our lists here



at Tawanda Farms, we ask how can we improve our husbandry of the land and to our animals? There is always 'room for improvement' as my mother would say.

Last year at lambing, one of the two of us was hurt quite badly by a ewe who did not want help having her lamb. It was a wakeup call for both of us. What would happen to the other person and consequently to the sheep, if one of us became disabled or not here at all? We took stock right then and there. We decided to reduce our flock by about one third. We are very thankful that our breeding stock is in great demand. We were able to reduce the number of breeding ewes by almost two thirds and still maintain enough for breeding stock sales as well as our meat market. So this year we have bred far fewer ewes, kept far fewer rams, and retired a number of the older girls. We feel strongly that the older ewes who have worked hard for us should not be trucked off to be dog food. So they have a group of their own taking care of replacement ewe lambs. Everything involved makes for easier feeding, better care and a sigh of relief.

That was a big improvement and now on to other improvements in the coming year. There is much to choose from so no decisions have been made. When things start to get hectic this time of year, take stock, see how you can improve your life and the way you live it. We are all, the animals and the people, children of God. Take a moment and thank God for the animals that give you food and clothing and for the people who tend them day in and day out. We are thankful for living in Siskiyou County and for the people who help us and for the products our customers buy.


wary, and as scarce as hens' teeth, but from time to time Fred liked to roust me out of my sleeping bag and say something like, "Come on Buddy, shake a leg...the moon is out and the deer will be browsing.... maybe we can do a little night hunting...huh."

It was an adventure. In the still of the night the forest closed in around us as we followed a meandering game trail. Fred walked slowly, stopping now and then, and turning to me, his fingers to his lips signaling that I was to keep it down... no talking.... shhhhhh!" But I kept bumping into him, as I was busy walking with my head turned so that I could tell if a Cougar or mountain lion was tagging along, sneaking up on me from behind. I knew the score—I knew that Cougars liked to snatch the last person tagging along the trail, or better yet, ambush its prey by laying stretched out on a limb just above the trail, unknown and unseen. I had them figured out.... no question. So I kept bumping into Fred's legs, upsetting the whole apple cart as the saying goes. "Damn it to Hell kid... watch where you're going."

Back at camp, Fred would stoke up the fire and put on a fresh pot of coffee. All the while, I was paying attention to the night sounds, a hoot owl from somewhere in the depths of the forest... a rustling sound of a raccoon coming down to drink or catch a crawdad from the little creek that ran by our camp, and the crashing sound of maybe a bear! Fred noticed and put his arm around my shoulders. "Don't let things bother you Buddy. Sometimes critters are just curious, and just checking us out. Like you would do if someone came along camped out in your backyard. Fred rolled a cigarette and lit up. When the water in the pot started rolling over a little, Fred would wait a minute or two then pour in a half a cup of cold water to settle the grounds. Then, using a pair of pliers, he'd pull it from the edge of the fire to let it cool down a little.

As we sat alongside each other holding our cups and scanning the star-lit heavens above and listening to the night sounds, Fred would break the silence and say, "What do you say we have a Hershey candy bar, Bud?" That sounded fine and dandy. Fred liked Hershey bars and bought them by the cartons whenever we went to town on payday weekends, so that we'd always have a goodly amount on hand. Fred had imposed a quota of one bar per day, no ifs and no doubts. But, every now and then, he'd say, "Ah, what to hell... let's have another one, what do you say, Buddy."

For as long as I can remember, whenever we were logging and hiking in on a trail, me tagging along, Fred had a part of a song he would sing over and over again. It was more of a poem, just a part of a poem that Uncle Fred would turn it into a melody. It went: "Oh for 40 years, we logged with steers, on the shores of Puget Sound, but now we're working' on a big Compound.... So take 'er out easy and skin 'er back slow... 'cause now we're a 'logging... on a Hemlock show."

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

Gail's fourth book with Two Dot, ONE ROOM: SCHOOLS AND SCHOOLTEACHERS IN THE PIONEER WEST examines a wide assortment of early one-room schools from across the western United States and features stories, histories, and vintage photographs of schools, students, and teachers who either attended them or taught in them. Heart-warming memories shared by old-timers as well as contemporaries reveal the ups and downs, the humor and the struggles that faced students and teachers alike. The reader is taken back to the nineteenth and twentieth century to when life was often difficult and when teachers—occasionally as young as 14 or 15—struggled to provide an opportunity to children from many walks of life, frequently in drafty, cold, rodent-infested or dimly lit "schools" with few books or paper.

Read about the harrowing "Children's Blizzard" of 1888, when 230 people (mostly children) were lost, in spite of the heroic efforts by teachers to get their students to safety. Read about the young schoolteacher who was hired and showed up to school with a loaded gun, fully armed and ready to take on the bullies in his class! Read about the schools constructed of sod, where cows or pigs rummaged around, feeding on cornstalk walls. Read about students who walked 5 or more miles to school (yes, in all kinds of weather) and had to contend with runaway horses.

As many as 200,000 + schools once dotted the national landscape, some without even a name. And while the book contains stories and sites from 14 western states, many local schools from all over the State of Jefferson have been included, including schools from Siskiyou, Shasta, Trinity, Tehama, Del Norte, Jackson, Jefferson, and Klamath Counties (to name a few!).

As noted by New York Best-Selling Author and Historian, Chris Enss, "Gail Jenner's book, One Room, reminds us of the humble beginnings of the heroic souls who were dedicated to educating children of all ages in whatever space was available. One Room is an inspiring read."

Gail Jenner's book is available locally at the Siskiyou County Museum as well as at Etna Hardware. And of course, it is available online. As a former teacher herself, Gail is especially proud of this latest book and is happy to share the stories she's gathered from the many generous people who eagerly submitted their family or personal stories.

#### "Crescent Sewer System Breaks Ground"

The ground breaking ceremony, held November 9th at the Crescent Community Club, marked the realization of work begun in 1976. Construction of the Crescent Sewer System is the most significant event to occur in north Klamath County since 1938 when Gilchrist Timber Company built its mill, the Klamath Northern Railroad and the town of Gilchrist. Building Crescent's sewer system clears the way for construction of new housing and for economic development. Dignitaries in attendance at the ground breaking ceremony included Derrick DeGroot, Klamath County Commissioner, and Mike McLane, State Representative.

Work over the last six years by Chuck Defoe, Derrick DeGroot, Chuck Lawrence and Mike McLane to arrange funding and the purchase of the land where the ponds are located is the reason construction has started. Representative Mike McLane worked in the Legislature to secure \$5 million in funding for the project. Commissioner DeGroot, in his capacity as chairman, led the County Commissioners in completing the needed zoning and permitting approvals for the project


Sewer construction commenced with the building of the ponds. The ponds are located on a 200 acre parcel south east of Crescent. The ponds consist of two five acre treatment ponds and a 20 acre storage pond for the treated effluent. The 20 acre pond is larger than needed but plans for future growth as well as winter storage when irrigation isn't possible will make this useful.

During the summer months the Crescent Sewer System will irrigate areas on the 200 acre parcel as well as making the treated water available to Oregon Department of Forestry, Walker Range, and the Forest Service to use the treated water for dust abatement on their roads and for any non-residential fire abatement. A fill station is available to those agencies for their use.

This coming spring, as soon as weather allows, construction will start on Crescent Sewer's collection network. It is anticipated that the collection network will become operational in July with hookups to start at that time and with completion by September 2019.

The Crescent Sewer System will initially serve all Crescent residents and businesses east of the Klamath Northern Railroad and from Osman Road in the north to Pinney Lane in the south. The system may eventually expand to include Crescent west of the Little Deschutes River and tie into Gilchrist's sewer system.


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Construction of the Crescent Sewer System will generate significant economic benefits. Currently new residences or businesses must build expensive sand filtration systems. This requirement has stalled new home construction and business development. It has stagnated Crescent. The new sewer will eliminate this additional expense. Municipalities that have infrastructure such as sewer, water, and gas tend to attract investors and business owners. The result of new business will bring new jobs to Crescent. History shows that property values increase when a sewer system is built. Crescent has already seen increased activity in anticipation of effects of the construction of the sewer system. Improvements to the Little Deschutes River's water quality is another benefit of the system's construction.

Chuck Lawrence, Project Manager said, "This has been a long awaited process. Previous boards have tried to bring the sewer system to town and have failed for various reasons. The main reason for success this time is due to past president Cher L. Dolan. Cher knew that in order to get the project done the District needed to hire a grant/fund raiser and Project Manager to work with the many agencies involved in a project of this size. Cher persuaded the Board to hire Jeffrey B. Yeley Consulting who I work for to provide these services. I came to this Project with many years of Project Management/Fund raising experience on projects as large as \$385million. The CSD Board has taken an active role in helping me through this process. Other key people have been Chuck and Judith Defoe, Rep. Mike Mclane, Annette Liebe from Gov. Kate Brown's office, many people from the Regional Solutions Team, DEQ, IFA, RCAC, and the Oregon State Legislature. The Board has gone through many changes of members since 2013 but every one of them as well as the current Board have been the best I have ever worked with. I could not have accomplished this without the entire team."

Said Representative Mike McLane in the matter of the ground breaking for the Crescent Sewer System: "The sewer system is smart both environmentally and economically. Today is a testament to how big changes can come when a community is unified in a mission to serve."

County Commissioner Derrick DeGroot said regarding the Crescent Sewer System, "This much needed infrastructure will not only address immediate needs of the local residents but will also open a door for additional development for this beautiful community."

The ground breaking for the Crescent Sewer System marks the start of a new chapter for Crescent and for all of north Klamath County. •




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


#### Roughing It on the Little Deschutes River 1934-1944 \*

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

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# STITCHING IN THE DITCH

Today I've got Grunge on my mind. What an odd name for such a versatile and popular fabric. The possibilities are endless, whether using the front or the back of the fabric.


Sometime in the late 1980's and somewhere in the area of Seattle, the merging of punk rock with heavy metal produced a sound known as grunge. That, however, has little to nothing to do with the fabric by Basic Grey by Moda. Wrapping oneself in a truly dark olive green grunge might make one look like she belonged to that musical subculture, but the fabric is far more versatile and useful than that.

Did you know that grunge is made by dyeing the fabric and then printing over it, sometimes more than once? That makes the back side of the fabric as useful as the front. Since the back provides a solid color, the contrasts are stunning. Perhaps more than anything, grunge knocks the depth of the design right out of the sewing room. There are currently 192 grunge colors, not all available at the same time and never in a single place. Can you imagine that? Grunge heaven.

Now, this is my dilemma—or one of them, at any rate. How do you find grunge in a fabric store? I mean, where exactly is it? Sometimes the bolts of grunge are all together, as a Moda collection. Sometimes, however, the bolts are separated from their fellows and included in their various color ways, such as oranges, blues, golds or blacks. I'm told that it is more accessible or useful when you can quickly spot the role that the fabric plays in the color way. In other words, some shops claim to sell more of the fabric when it is displayed in this way.

Shakespeare once asked "What's in a name?" I would answer, A grunge by any other name would smell more sweetly. No insult intended to Romeo and Juliet. •

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
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


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
