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

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# "On the Road to . . ."

### "On the Road to Bald Rock"

History and the sciences of paleontology, archaeology, geology, and anthropology collide in a unique way at one of the most intriguing and beautiful places in the entire north state. Today we'll visit that place and learn of its history and beauty as we get On The Road To Bald Rock.

John Bidwell discovered gold near Bald Rock in 1848. Bidwell's mining camp grew into the city of "Bidwell's Bar" which, in 1853 became the second seat of Butte County Government. The first county seat was the city of "Hamilton" south of Oroville. In 1850 California's

the first suspension bridge gave access to Bidwell's Bar. In 1855 the original bridge washed out in a flood. The bridge was rebuilt and reopened in 1856. The 1856 Bridge was moved to the south side of Lake Oroville and today it serves as a pedestrian bridge. The bridge was funded by Judge Joseph Lewis. Interestingly Lewis was also responsible for beginning a multimillion dollar agribusiness but that is a story for a future column.

1856 was a pivotal year for Bidwell's Bar. The gold played out, the miners left and it became just another gold rush ghost town. However, the knockout punch came in August of 1856 when the county seat was moved to its permanent home in nearby "Ophir" (now Oroville). Bidwell's Bar literally sank into history when Oroville Dam was completed. The rising waters of Lake Oroville swallowed it up in 1968

For the "Jurassic Park" paleontologist there are fossil bearing deposits holding ammonites as well as fossilized plants throughout the region. If you lean more towards "Indiana Jones" this area holds great significance. There are a number of Native American archeological sites in the region. These ancient sites are tremendously important. Their locations are rigorously protected to prevent "pot hunters" from removing relics and desecrating burial sites. They offer tremendous insight into to the daily lives of Mountain Maidu, the first people to inhabit the area. The people, their culture, their history, the town of Bidwell's Bar, and California's first suspension bridge all exist in the shadow of Bald Rock.





Be thankful - be happy - and be in the moment.

A basic understanding of geology is a necessity in engineering, building, and understanding the environment of our celestial home. The early miners in the region would have been outstanding geologists, albeit without the 'formal' education. Often they knew from experience what to expect when prospecting a new area. It was this knowledge that led to the discovery of gold and led to the successful construction of California's first suspension bridge. Geology also tells us that today's destination not only "looks" like the granite domes of Castle Crags and Yosemite, they are essentially the same.

As with its better known cousins, Bald Rock geologically is what is known as a "batholith." A batholith is a granite deposit formed deep beneath the earth's crust. Batholiths are formed under intense heat and pressure. Geologic forces gradually push the hard igneous rock to the surface. Once exposed to the elements the granite eventually begins to slough off sheets of granite as natural erosion takes its toll. Battered by ice, baked by the sun and weathered by the incessant forces of wind and rain, the granite gradually gives way to stunning natural sculptures.

Studying Bald Rock we also learn a great deal about the Mountain Maidu. Even a cursory look at the surface of Bald Rock reveals a large number of grinding holes. These were used for grinding large quantities of acorns into meal over hundreds and perhaps thousands, of years. The Maidu diet consisted of acorn meal along with fish from the waterways, edible seeds, nuts, plants and the wild game. Acorns were transported here in enormous quantities. The volume of grinding holes and their depth indicates that this site had been used over a very long period of time with tons of acorns being ground. The obvious conclusion is that this site is a culturally and spiritually sacred place for the Mountain Maidu. According to Maidu beliefs, a monster named Uino lives at Bald Rock, protecting it and watching over the Feather River below.

Reaching Bald Rock is a leisurely drive from the valley floor. Leave Oroville eastbound on Highway 162 to the Olive Highway. Go east on Olive Highway toward Berry Creek. Approximately 16 miles east of Oroville is Bald Rock Road. Turn right off of the Highway onto Bald Rock Road. Follow Bald Rock Road 5 miles to the Bald Rock Trail Head parking lot on the left. The trail out to the rock is an easily traversed quarter mile trail. Before you realize it you will walk out from the tree canopied trail into the sunshine and onto the rock.

Stepping onto the outcropping for the first time, it is easy to understand the reverence the Maidu had for this place.

Examine and explore the natural tunnels and crevices. Seek out the Maidu grinding holes and remember their historical and cultural significance. Admire Mother Nature's marvelous handiwork. Lone pieces of granite seem tilted at impossible angles. Gravity seems to be held in abeyance where bus sized boulders sit precariously on the steep, smooth slopes seeming to peak into the deep canyon (see photo below right). Some boulders are eroded, undercut and carved by windblown sand (called a "hoodoo"). They take on personalities all their own. To me, one resembled a bird of prey complete with curved beak gazing skyward; one struck me as a Spanish Vaquero's saddle with a high cantle and pommel (see photo below left). Another appeared to be an elephant seal while to Priscilla it appeared to be a resting lamb.

Art truly is in the eye of the beholder. Many boulders and sheets of granite appear ready to pitch the canyon below. From the top one can look over most of the valley below. On a clear day you can see from the Coast Range to the Sutter Buttes. Take your time, enjoy the solitude and if you see me there say hello so we can enjoy the view together On The Road to Bald Rock. •



Close to 100 people attended dedication ceremonies for the Siskiyou County High School historical plaque during the 1995 July 4th weekend. The Star Spangled Banner played over the speaker system as the ceremony began about 11 a.m. Master of ceremonies, Dan Weimers, representing E Clampus Vitus, spoke about the monument and introduced each presenter. Terry Alderson, presiding Noble Grand Humbug of the Yreka ECV Chapter, confirmed their strong sentiments for preserving local history. Mary Ann Dillon from the Yreka High Centennial Committee spoke about the time capsule embedded within the monument. Items placed in the capsule included a 1994 Yreka High School commemorative program, copies of the Siskiyou Daily News Centennial Edition, Blue Goose Gazette and the Pioneer Press. # Visit California's Newest Welcome Center



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# DUNSMUIR HISTORY

# "The Babe Ruth Story"

One of Dunsmuir's favorite stories is the one about Babe Ruth. George Hermann Ruth – known as Babe - is one of those larger than life figures whose name is nearly as recognizable today as it was 90 years ago. Even non-baseball fans know of his fame as a great baseball player. It's a source of pride in Dunsmuir that "the Babe" once played baseball in the Dunsmuir Ball Park. How that happened is a story in itself.

It was 1924, just a year after the completion of Yankee Stadium in New York. Baseball – America's national pastime – was in its prime, not only at the national level, but also at the hometown level. Many – if not most – small towns had baseball teams and some even had semi-pro teams, with paid players. Competition was fierce between towns. In those days before television, baseball was great entertainment and the rivalry between Dunsmuir, Mount Shasta, Weed and McCloud drew fans to the games.

That fall, after the season was over and the World Series had been won by the Washington Senators, Babe Ruth wanted to "hit the road." He was noted for being restless after the season ended and eager to join with a few of his New York Yankee team buddies, get away from the pressures of the sport and have some fun and relaxation traveling around the country. At that time however, major league baseball had been through some rough years and was recovering from some painful reforms. Judge Kenesaw Landis – the first baseball commissioner – had cleaned up the sport from some serious corruption and abuses including "fixed" games. He ruled the sport with an iron fist and had even expelled several players.

Judge Landis was opposed to "the Babe" and his buddies' plans to go touring. He was still angry that Babe Ruth and his team mate and traveling pal Bob Meusel had defied his orders and gone on a post-season tour in 1921. He had sanctioned the two – ordered them to seek his approval for their actions. In stepped Christy Walsh, a pioneer in the public relations field and baseball's first agent. He had taken over almost all of Babe Ruth's business interests – and "the Babe" needed his help since he was noted for being virtually out of control in handling money. Walsh was able to put together a plan to travel by train over 8,500 miles, playing exhibition games along the way, accompanied by a vaudville act – Bishop and MacKenzie – singing and doing comedy routines.

Enter Frank Talmadge – Dunsmuir's own promoter. Frank Talmadge was the prime mover in Dunsmuir's night life, entertainment, tourism, restaurant and lodging business. He owned a large community hall, theater and movie house known as the Auditorium, as well as the Palm Café and Joyland.

"Let each man exercise the Art he knows." - Aristophanes

Talmadge the promoter presented a plan to Walsh the agent. He knew of the tour and that Babe Ruth would be making appearances in Portland and then San Francisco. Traveling by rail, the group would have to pass through Dunsmuir. Christy Walsh wanted \$1000 for Babe and his entourage to stop and spend time in Dunsmuir and Frank Talmadge persuaded the Dunsmuir Lions Club to come up with the money. Unfortunately, the Lions could only come up with \$300 so Talmadge himself donated the balance. And the deal was made.

Babe and his tour arrived in Dunsmuir on train number 53 from Portland, Oregon on Tuesday, October 21 and was met by mayor E. J. Cornish and other leading citizens. He was scheduled to attend a meeting of the Dunsmuir Boy Scout troop but the train was running late and did not arrive until after 11 pm. The next afternoon was the Big Game. Nine hundred fans crowded the grandstand and watched from the sidelines. Local baseball players from Dunsmuir, Mount Shasta, McCloud and Weed formed two teams. One included Babe Ruth and the other counted Bob Meusel. There is a story that Babe Ruth spoke to the pitcher on the other team and suggested that he pitch right over the plate because, "Folks didn't come here to see me walk." During the game, Babe hit two home runs, one of which flew all the way to the Cave Springs Resort and was later certified at 604 feet. Babe's team won the game that became legend.

The next day, Babe and Bob Meusel were taken on a fishing expedition on the Klamath River and they caught two steelhead. That night the Dunsmuir Lions Club hosted them at a dinner at the Travelers Hotel and after that they made a public appearance. They told stories, autographed baseballs and presented a championship cup to the Dunsmuir High School football team.


Babe and his group then went on to San Francisco and in a letter to Reva Coon and her Dunsmuir baseball player husband, "Bones" Coon, Babe said, "To everybody (and that means everybody) in Dunsmuir, Calif. We don't know yet how to tell you what a wonderful time we had in Dunsmuir. When it comes to beautiful girls, wonderfully fine fellows, and the real two-fisted spirit of California—little Dunsmuir gave us more laughs, more hospitality, more thrills, and more things to remember than any place between Broadway & Shasta."

Sixty-two years later, on June 14, 1986, the Native Sons of the Golden West dedicated a bronze plaque mounted next to the grandstand near the entrance to the Dunsmuir ballpark. It reads,

"Baseball legend 'Babe' Ruth and his New York Yankee team mate Bob Meusel played in an exhibition game with local teams here on October 22, 1924."

Ron McCloud is co-author with Deborah Harton of a history of Dunsmuir published by the Arcadia Publishing Company in 2010. He is the owner of Dunsmuir Hardware which dates to 1894.

# HISTORY OF YREKA

# "Yreka Studio"

Over the years many different photography studios have had their businesses in Yreka, but one photographer has stood out over the years. "Snappy Goodrich".

John D. Goodrich was born in 1899 and spent time in the Los Angeles area prior to coming to Yreka. In 1923 he married Minnie Dae Clodfelter. It has not been exactly determined what year he arrived in Yreka, but by 1933 he is listed in the Yreka City Directory operating the Yreka Studio. The front half of his business location was dedicated to the studio and the back half served as the residence for him and his wife. His business was located at 111 South Oregon Street in Yreka, right behind the Ley Fire Station.

The Yreka Studio was "the" place to have one's photo portrait taken, and he had a lively business with seniors from the High School as well as other important events.







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During these years (1930s – 1940s) when one had a roll of film to be developed ~ it was taken to a photo shop and developed. One day service in automated machines was unheard of, not to mention digital images! In addition to his portrait studio, he was an active photographer in the post card business. Many of his post card images are currently revered for their historic content and views! From time to time his post cards appear on eBay and many times they command a good price. Next time a older postcard is found, turn it over and look to see who the photographer or artist was; you may find a little treasure! Goodrich traveled up and down the northwest taking photos for his postcard sales. By 1945 he advertised on the back of his postcards as "Snappy's Scenic Portraits of the West."

"Snappy" was also an active community member and an effective member of the once well known 20-

30 Club in Yreka. This was a business club of young men who were essentially the "movers and shakers" of town. In fact, Snappy was quite active in the 1941 State of Jefferson Rebellion promoting activism through the club.

"Snappy" operated the Yreka Studio for many years, in 1949 his wife, Dae, passed away and he continued for a short while in the business, but in 1951 he sold the business to an individual by the name of Young who carried on the Yreka Studio. In later years the business was known as the Yreka Studio and Camera Shop or commonly referred to as YS & CS. Many of the folks alive today remember the YS & CS and the large sign that once advertised the business on old north Hwy 99; it was just a short distance from town and was a notable landmark that arrival in Yreka was imminent.

Information on the Yreka Studio is relatively scarce while Snappy Goodrich operated the business, although his skill behind the camera will live on for many years to come. ◆



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# DISCOVERING THE STATE OF JEFFERSON

By Gail Jenner – Enjoy another new story of the many historical towns and areas scattered throughout The State of Jefferson.

# "Hayfork, California"

Hayfork is the second largest town in Trinity County with a population of about 2,400. It is second to Weaverville, which is Trinity's largest town and county seat. The area was settled in 1851 during the California Gold Rush after gold was discovered along Trinity River in 1848. One of the more famous mines in the area was the Whiskey Hill or Tom Cook mine.

Reportedly the first outsider to the area was most likely Jedediah Smith, in 1828, who traveled through here on his way to Oregon. The expedition he led traveled up Hayfork Creek and the South Fork of the Trinity, then along the Trinity and Klamath Rivers before reaching the Pacific coast of Northern California and Oregon. This same route later became a popular route between California's Central Valley and the coast.

The town of Hayfork was first called Kingsberrys, aka Kingsbury; it then became known as South Fork and Hay Town. In 1854, it was renamed Hayfork because of the hay produced in the valley and the town's proximity to the North Fork of the South Fork of Trinity River. By 1860, the town boasted 1,200 people.

This area was originally home to the Wintu people who built permanent winter camps along the local streams; during the warmer months they traveled to higher-elevation places to hunt. Salmon and acorns, berries, and small game provided the bulk of their diet.

With the area's abundant water and mild climate, the settlers who followed the miners began to farm the Hayfork Valley; the rich valley quickly became the local "bread basket" of Trinity County.

Hayfork Creek is a tributary of the South Fork of the Trinity River and is more than 50 miles long. It is the longest tributary of Trinity River. It travels north through the Shasta-Trinity National Forest and enters Hayfork Valley, a large basin, which is one of Trinity's primary agricultural regions. It also passes Highway 3 and the community of Hayfork. It then wends its way through a steep gorge between narrow cliffs, creating whitewater rapids that are popular with rafting enthusiasts.

The forested mountains in this area decrease in height from east to west, with peaks of 6,000 feet to ridges of 4,500 feet above the South Fork of the Trinity River. Hayfork Creek meets up with the South Fork of the Trinity River south of the small community of Hyampom. Although timber was an important industry, the local mill was closed several years ago.



Located in the Hayfork Valley, there is a "natural bridge" that is one of Trinity's natural wonders and part of its rich history. The nearby Natural Bridge, a geologic formation, is also an important Wintu Historical Site. The exterior mass of the bridge was solid until water, through the course of time, forced itself through the soft limestone, creating the passage.


According to Wintu legend, the Bridge was formed when a mystical man, carrying a huge bundle of hides, came down Bridge Gulch tired and hungry. When he slipped the bundle fell and rolled into the creek. As a result, the Bridge was called "Kok-Chee-Shup-Chee", or "Bundle of Hides," because of the texture and color of the walls. The Bridge is managed by the Shasta-Trinity National Forest.

The Bridge was also the site of a bloody and tragic massacre. In 1852, a well-known settler from Weaverville was murdered and his cattle stolen. After his body was found, a search party tracked a group of Wintu to their camp located at the confluence of Bridge Gulch and Hayfork Creek. Seeking vengeance, about 70 whites set out from Weaverville and brutally massacred 153 of the 155 villagers in what became known as the Bridge Gulch Massacre. Reportedly only 2 (or perhaps 3) children survived the attack.

Today, Hayfork Creek has become known for its Class III to V rapids, but the scenic valley remains rural and relatively unchanged. The area is also known for its occasional Bigfoot sightings.

Hayfork also hosts the annual Trinity County Fair, which is now one of the truly last "country fairs" in California.


The fair's history dates back to 1921 and H.C. Smith, a local Hayfork rancher who finally succeeded in helping to organize a local fair. In 2010, the Trinity County Fair was featured on PBS. Because of state budget cuts, the Hayfork BIGFOOT BBQ, a Pro-Am Competition, was created to help support the fair. This year's Bigfoot BBQ is scheduled for September 13, 2014, and the county fair is scheduled for August 8, 9, and 10. ◆






# Scott Bar Community Hall



Scott Bar's claim to gold fame is that it is the first place gold was discovered in Siskiyou County. 



# Red Flags of Elder Abuse

Do you know a senior who displays any warning signs of mistreatment?



### Neglect & Physical Abuse

- Lack of basic hygiene, adequate food, medical aids (walker, teeth, hearing aid, medications), clean appropriate clothing, untreated pressure "bed" sores
- · Person with dementia left unsupervised
- Bed bound person left without care
- Home cluttered, in disrepair, or having fire & safety hazards
- Inadequate facilities (stove, refrigerator, heat/cooling, working plumbing/electricity)
- · Inadequately explained fractures, bruises, cuts or burns

### Financial Abuse

- Lack of amenities victim could afford; Elder "voluntarily" giving inappropriate financial reimbursement for needed care/companionship
- Caregiver has control of elder's money but is failing to provide for elder's needs
- Caretaker "living off" the elder
- Elder has signed property transfers (Power of Attorney, new will, etc.) when unable to comprehend the transaction

# Psychological Abuse

- · Caregiver isolates the elder (doesn't let anyone into the home or speak to the elder)
- Caregiver is verbally aggressive, demeaning, controlling, overly concerned about spending money, or uncaring




